

Update Report



## INTRODUCTION

The Adopt-A-Health Facility Programme (ADHFP), in partnership with The Aig-Imoukhuede Foundation, continues its commitment to strengthening primary healthcare delivery in Edo State. The program is revitalizing 18 PHCs across the state, with four PHCs successfully completed and fully operational as part of Phase 1 of the project. This report provides updates on the operational performance of these facilities as of February 2025, highlighting patient utilization trends, service delivery improvements, and key performance metrics.

## OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE ANALYSIS

Since their launch in September 2024, the four rehabilitated PHCs (Atoruru, Uteh, Idunmwungha, and Evbuodia) have recorded significant improvements in service utilization. Data from facility assessments indicate increased patient attendance, antenatal care (ANC) visits, facility-based deliveries, immunization coverage, and malaria treatment.


Also, Health Facility Management Committees (HFMCs) and Ward Development Committees (WDCs) have been established/strengthened in each operational facility to oversee management, monitor service delivery, and promote community involvement.


## Facility Attendance (General Attendance and OPD)

Facility attendance has steadily increased across all four PHCs, with a 67% rise in outpatient consultations compared to pre-revitalization levels. Idunmwungha PHC recorded the highest attendance, followed by Atoruru PHC.

General Attendance 2025





OPD Attendance 2025



# Antenatal Care (ANC) and Deliveries


The PHCs have seen a 70% increase in ANC visits, with a corresponding 46% rise in facility-based deliveries. This reflects improved maternal healthcare services and increased community trust.




# Immunization

Routine immunization coverage across the four PHCs has improved due to enhanced services at the PHCs and better outreach programs.

Fully Immunisation 2023 vs 2024




Children fully Immunised 2025




## Malaria Cases & Treatment

A significant reduction in malaria-related complications has been observed due to improved diagnostic capacity and medication availability.


Malaria- Children Positive 2025

## KEY CHALLENGES



**Human Resource Gaps:** Despite improvements, staffing shortages persist in some PHCs, affecting service efficiency. This is due to the pending SLA to be signed with the state government.

**Community Awareness:** Continuous sensitization is needed to encourage more facility-based deliveries and maternal healthcare utilization.

## NEXT STEPS

### Service Level Agreement (SLA) Execution:

Finalize agreements to ensure the full operationalization of PHCs.



### Expansion to Nine More PHCs:

Begin assessments and revitalization for the next phase of the project.



### Staff recruitment and Capacity Building:

Recruit and strengthen healthcare worker training programs.



### Enhanced Monitoring & Evaluation:

Continue facility data collection to improve evidence-based decision-making.
